Project Highlight

Northern Peninsula Area Regional Council set to fly with

\$13.4 million airport upgrade

The state's most northern airstrip will undergo significant upgrades that will provide vital infrastructure for passengers, businesses and emergency services.

The Northern Peninsula Area Regional Council-owned airstrip upgrades are possible thanks to funding from the federal government's '**Growing Regions Program**' fund. The upgrades will improve the current aircraft weight restrictions, and pavement stabilisation to allow larger passenger planes and emergency aircraft, such as the Royal Flying Doctor and LifeFlight, to land in various conditions.

Council's CEO, Kate Gallaway, said this essential funding is crucial for the viability of the region and will be a lifeline in the wet season.

"Given the size of our community, the airstrip is our only link to the rest of Australia during the wet season," Ms Gallaway said.

"It is critical for disaster resilience and response as well as community wellbeing to have this project completed."

Ms Gallaway explained council secured the expertise of grant writers at Peak Services to prepare and write the extensive grant application and supporting documents to secure the funding.

"Council has been investing in improving the capacity of our local staff in grants and project management," Ms Gallaway said.

"Peak Services provides key technical support to complement the skill sets of our existing staff workforce."

Peak Services' Principal Advisor and Grant Officer Manager, Zoe Dark, said that securing funding for vital projects in remote regions, in partnership with councils, is a key driver to consistently deliver competitive funding submissions.

"We are honoured to have had the privilege of working closely with council to secure essential funding for the remote region. It's crucial that these regions receive the support they need for vital infrastructure projects," Ms Dark said.

"Our grants team work alongside council with unwavering commitment and passion for their communities, which is instrumental in achieving this success."

The funding will allow the project designs to be finalised followed by construction works to upgrade the length of the airport runway, pavement strengthening and stabilisation, improve surface smoothness, and construct drainage channels. The project will also stimulate capital expenditure within the region, improve accessibility and food security for residents and improve access for visitors to support regional tourism.

Project Highlight

Grant win delivers major upgrades for **Central Highlands Regional Council** sports, entertainment and airport facilities



People living, working, or visiting the Central Highlands Region of Queensland, will soon get to enjoy a beautified botanic garden, entertainment centres, sports fields & clubhouse, and a new aquatic centre, thanks to **almost \$30 million** in funding. Anyone needing the help of the Royal Flying Doctor Service will also benefit from smoother and safer access.

These upgrades and new builds are part of a \$28.2 million funding package for six major community projects secured by Peak Services for the Central Highland Regional Council through Round 3 of the Resources Community Infrastructure Fund.

The fund aims to improve access to essential services, enhance community wellbeing, and address social inequality in Queensland's resource communities. Additionally, it seeks to boost community safety and support disadvantaged groups by supplementing the state's infrastructure investments to deliver new, beneficial projects.

Council spokesperson, Leisa Donlan, said she believed a major factor in the successful grant applications was the high level of collaboration between council's Project Teams and Peak Services' Grants Management Team, who worked together to develop robust business and community cases for each project.

Ms Donlan emphasised the importance of being prepared for grant applications and the preparedness should start well before funding rounds are released.

"My advice to other Councils is to know your strengths and weaknesses, and if grant writing isn't your strongest point - then get expert help. Make sure you have your projects well planned to define the needs, specifications, budget and costs. Evidence of community support is essential, so make sure you have a means of gauging community and business input. Government funders also look for strong links to national, regional and local strategic plans and, increasingly, evidence of sustainability within each project," Ms Donlan said.

Peak Services was pleased to help council apply for the funds to upgrade the McIndoe Park Sports Field Facilities, Emerald Airport RFDS Apron and Central Highlands Regional Entertainment Venues, redevelopment of the Emerald Regional Botanic Gardens, build the Springsure Aquatic Centre 17 Metre Pool and the Bridgeman Park Club House.

The application process involved the full suite of documentation and included evidence of project need and benefit, detailed designs, approvals, site plans, full costings, cash flow summaries, project plans, works schedules, cost benefits analyses, evidence for stakeholder support, evidence of links to relevant strategic plans, sustainability, risk management and evidence of capacity to deliver.

Celebrating working with Laynhapuy Homelands Aboriginal Corporation

Finding support and project wins in East Arnhem Land



The Laynhapuy homelands movement is a proud and historic initiative of Yolngu (local people), inspired by clan elders, who sought to determine their own future, conduct affairs according to Yolngu 'lore', and live and raise their families on their traditional Land.

In April 1972, following decades in various missions, Yolngu senior elders and their extended family began to move away from the Yirrkala Mission and the expanding mining town and back to their clan land around Arnhem Land. Their vision being to develop sustainable, self-sufficient homelands.

With the help of Ngapaki (non-Indigenous people) from the Mission, Yolngu build their homes using trees from their land and cleared land for airstrips.

Laynhapuy Homelands Aboriginal Corporation (LHAC or Laynha) was established in 1985 and enjoys a proud history of supporting Yolngu to live on their traditional clan land. With some 30 homeland communities, Laynha provides health, community, housing and infrastructure services to a population of approximately 1,100 Yolngu residents and 300 regular visitors. This support extends to Yirrkala Rangers Land and Sea Management in East Arnhem Land – 33,310 square kilometres in the far north-east corner of the Northern Territory.

Like most First Nations communities, it is very difficult to develop sustainable own source revenue to meet the most basic of human needs and as a result there is a heavy reliance on the various funding streams to deliver the much needed community services to support housing, health, and critical infrastructure.

Peak Service's Grants Office has been working with Laynhapuy Homelands Aboriginal Corporation to strengthen their funding applications and manage their grants program. This partnership has already proven incredibly successful, with funding secured for over 30 projects, a combined value of over \$17 million dollars. These funds help Laynha deliver essential services to these remote homeland communities. Two successful applications under the **National Indigenous Australians Agencies', Aboriginals Benefit Account Open Grant** opportunity were secured for the installation and commissioning of a Hybrid Solar power system. The projects involve the design, supply, installation, and commission of a Hybrid Solar power system in both Gangan and Baniyala and aim to provide the community with a robust and resilient power supply to improve access to essential services, health, hygiene, and well-being.

This Hybrid Solar power system will contribute long-term financial savings to the community, provide cleaner, more reliable power for residents and services, and provide employment opportunities for the community as a local team will be trained to maintain the new equipment.

Another great result stemming from our partnership was the announcement that 9 out of 9 applications submitted to the Homelands Housing, Municipal and Essential Services Grant Capital Funding program were successful.

The projects submitted for funding involved over 50 bodies of work across Laynha's some 30 homeland communities. With lots of moving parts, Peak's Grants team worked closely with Laynha to break down the works and package them into 9 applications to increase value for money and capacity to deliver - contributing to Laynha's chance of success. Projects will contribute to improved health and environmental outcomes across some 30 homeland communities. These projects range from:

- Building fit-for-purpose waste management systems to ensure efficient and environmental disposal of waste
- Sewerage upgrades to provide effluent designated areas
- Installation of toilets and showers
- Replacement of end-of-life bore pumps with energyefficient solarpower pumps
- Installation of solar power hot water systems
- Roof replacements, and
- Upgrading existing power mains at airstrips.

Regional Connectivity Program

Three Out of Three Projects Funded

Following the release of the Commonwealth Government's Regional Connectivity Program (RCP) in 2020, Peak's Grants Team was contacted by three remote councils who wanted their communities to have access to affordable, fast and reliable mobile and internet services that RCP funded projects could offer. But they were unsure how to go about sourcing a suitable telecommunications provider to access the funding and secure a project in their region.

Peak's team then took over the process – from advertising the opportunity on the RCP notice board, liaising with potential telecommunication providers, accessing their suitability and experience in remote areas, as well as matching the communities' needs to the services the telcos could offer. Peak's team then took its recommendations back to the councils to let them decide which potential applicant was the best fit for their individual needs.

The grants team then acted as a liaison between the individual councils and their preferred supplier to ensure the applications represented the issues and opportunities on the ground, including cost benefit analysis and articulating the social, safety and health benefits the projects could afford these communities.

On 16 April 2021, the Deputy Prime Minister, the Hon Michael McCormack MP, the Minister for Communications, Urban Infrastructure, Cities and the Arts, the Hon Paul Fletcher MP, and the Minister for Regional Health, Regional Communications and Local Government, the Hon Mark Coulton MP, announced that 81 communications infrastructure projects had been funded throughout Australia under the RCP.

All applications Peak Services was involved in were successfully funded. These projects provide people in these communities with access to essential online services, assisting them to utilise new business tools and connect with the digital economy.



Projects Successfully Funded

- Telstra secured \$2,661,731 to deliver a project to upgrade the capacity of the existing Telstra 4GX mobile facility in the Indigenous community of Gununa on Mornington Island. The project will also upgrade the existing fibre network between Mount Isa and Point Parker, and deploy a new mobile site near Century Mine, to provide microwave backhaul capacity to Mornington Island. The upgrades will support the delivery of government services, as well as health and education resources. Improved connectivity will also support expanded business opportunities in cultural and fishing tourism.
- Barcoo Shire Council secured \$101,873 to support Telstra's 4GX mobile base station east of Stonehenge. The new base station will address a coverage black spot on the Thomson Development Road and will increase coverage on the Stonehenge to Yaraka Road, improving traveller safety, emergency communications and freight monitoring.
- Field Solutions Group was successful in gaining \$356,908 to deploy a fixed wireless network in the Cape York town of Napranum. The network will enable the efficient delivery of essential services, such as health, education, public safety and cultural heritage initiatives supported by the Napranum Aboriginal Shire Council.

Building Our Regions - Round 6 Highlights

38 Queensland councils received a share of \$60 million in funding from Round 6 Building our Regions (BoR) - Infrastructure Stream program.

This funding program focuses on delivering enduring economic outcomes for regional communities, with infrastructure projects that create jobs that will improve local economic conditions and liveability.

With more than 24% of the total funding pool going to the councils we worked with; Peak is proud to showcase a **100% success rate** assisting 8 Queensland councils to secure **\$15,778,648** across 20 separate EOIs and completed applications.
