Officers help to enforce Queensland's animal control laws; respond to complaints; capture and impound animals; may assist with animal disease control; educate the public; investigate animal bites and attacks; rescue injured or distressed animals and will also collaborate with other agencies such as Police and Wildlife Services to address issues related to animal control, public safety and wildlife management.
